

Monday, January 8, 1990, the Honorable Commissioners Court met in a regular session at 8:30 A. M., with the following members present:

Meeting was called to order by Judge Royce Smith, with Brother Clarence Howell leading the opening prayer.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Commissioner Billy McGee made the motion, which was seconded by Commissioner Chester Cox, to approve minutes. Motion carried.

After the inspection of County bills, Commissioner McGee made the motion to pay accounts and salaries. Commissioner Cox seconded, and all voted for.

Written reports from the County Treasurer, County Clerk, District Clerk, and Tax Assessor/Collector were reviewed. Commissioner McGee then made the motion to approve reports. Commissioner Conn seconded, and motion carried.

Commissioner Chester Cox asked that agenda item # 4, Commission for Economical Development, and item # 7, Speed Limit in Shamrock Shores Subdivision, be postponed.

A Proposal was presented from Sabine County Judge and Commissioners Court to Shelby County Independent School District Board of Trustees, concerning the Sexton Community School building and property. See attached exhibit. There is a need for a public polling place in this area, and this could solve our problem. The Court had agreed to combine voting Prct. 5 and 10, but this has been withdrawn.

Commissioner Cox made a motion that the Court accept this proposal, and asked that all sign, so he can present it to the Shelby county School District today, Jan. 8th. Commissioner Conn seconded and all voted for.

Mrs. Maggie Hauser met with the Court explaining the Crime Stoppers program. She had a Crime Stoppers Information Operation Manuel. The Crime Stoppers program must be certified, and citizens are the key information source. After some discussion, the court thanked Mrs. Hauser for her work, and the report she gave. She had addresses and phone numbers of people involved in this program. See attached exhibit.

Sheriff Greer said he would be ^{interested} in meeting with some of the Coordinators for more information on this. Commissioner McGee made a motion, which was seconded by Commissioner Conn, to accept Mrs. Hauser's report and recommendation to contact David M. Cobos and Sgt. Dan R. Geen, and set up a time to meet with them. Motion carried. An open afternoon meeting will be good, if possible.

Tom Phillips, Sheriff Greer, and other local law officers, met with the Court concerning the County's faulty radio system. Officer Philips had letters from different law men, District Attorney Charles Mitchell, and Attorney R. Earl LOrd, asking for a new and up-dated radio system. Motorola is checking about a Stilite on the ^{Water} Tower at Fox Hunters' Hill. Since no cost figures were available, no action was taken at this time. Commissioner Conn made a motion, which was seconded by Commissioner McGee, to accept reports presented as a matter of record. Motion carried.

Commissioner Conn made a motion to amend his budget by transferring funds in R&B 3 to pay his truck off. This will be \$39,250.00 plus interest of \$1,743.65, making a total of \$40,993.65. Commissioner McGee seconded this motion, and all voted for.


Although Jan Paradis was on the agenda, she was not present.


Trooper W. G. Bradberry has requested to be on the agenda for January 22nd concerning a radar unit.






Commissioner McGee made a motion, seconded by Commissioner McDaniel, that meeting adjourn. Motion carried.



The purpose of our visit to Commissioners Court is to inform the Court and the public served by the Sabine County Sheriff's Department of a dangerous situation existing in the county. The existing radio system utilized by the Sheriff's Department is old, worn out, and in an increasingly large percentage of the time - Useless.

All law enforcement units which operate in Sabine County-
Deputies

City of Hemphill officers

City of Pineland officer

Constables

D P S

Game Wardens

are all one man units, meaning they have to rely heavily on their radios, which in Sabine County, cannot be relied on.

911 is scheduled to be implemented in the near future. It will do very little good to have the necessary phone equipment and personnel to operate 911, if once the call is received at the Sheriff's Department it cannot be dispatched to field units because of faulty radio equipment. It is feasible that a wrongful death suit could be filed against the County, and won due to this communication problem. This is a problem that could be prevented by the purchase of new radio equipment.

I would like to read the following statements from the law enforcement officers of Sabine County into the



TO: SABINE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT:

I have been employed by Sabine County, in law enforcement for over 10 years. Communications have been a problem as long as I have been employed here. The South end of the county is a dead area from Beechwood to Brookeland. There have been several times I have made arrests in the Six-Mile area and Brookeland and actually needed the assistance of another officer and could not make contact with the Sheriff's Department because of worn out and outdated equipment or interference from another area. There are also times when we cannot contact the S.O. from approximately 2 miles South of Hemphill. Due to the size of the Sheriff's Department, it is necessary that we work as one man units, in fact all the law enforcement entities that work Sabine County, do so as one man units, which makes it mandatory to have a reliable communications system, and at the present time we don't. Because of the very nature of our work, there are times when radio communications, of a sensitive nature, or messages that should not be heard by the very people we are trying to apprehend. Radio communications utilized today by most law enforcement agencies enables them to have secure communications at the push of a button. This technology is a must for 20th Century Law enforcement. I am hoping that the Commissioners Court in Sabine County will see fit to let the Sabine County Sheriff's Department enter the 20th century, both for the safety of the officers involved and for the better protection and service to the citizens of Sabine County.

Gentlemen:

I have been employed with the Sabine County Sheriff's Department as a Deputy Sheriff for only a short time, but in that time there has been a great number of times, while on patrol, that I could not contact the Sheriff's Office because of interference or of dead spots in the county.


I mostly work the south end of the County and the Brookeland area late at night. This is mostly all a dead zone. If you attempt to contact the Sheriff's Office after 10:00 P.M. from Brookeland, or be contacted in that area, it is almost impossible due to the fact our radio equipment is so old and outdated.

I have been informed by radio repairmen that our radio equipment is so outdated that you cannot even buy new parts for them when they break down. I feel this is a very serious matter that needs your attention immediately. All of our officers work alone as one man units which makes us rely on our radio a great deal and at times we cannot do that.

If we do not replace our old out of date radio equipment very soon, the time will come when an officer or a member of the public will be seriously injured due to not being able to get the help needed because of bad radio equipment. When that happens the cost of new radio equipment will look very small compared to the amount of the law suit or law suits that could be filed:


A matter related to our visit to Commissioners Court today, and one which we feel does not need any more public attention than it has already received, is the use of the inter-city radio frequency by commissioners and their employees.

We wanted to call the courts' attention to a couple of items that it could be unaware of. The inter-city radio frequency granted to the Sheriff's Department is a specific use frequency for law enforcement purposes only. This frequency is used by surrounding law enforcement agencies for contact between departments.

Discussions on this frequency about broken backhoes and dump trucks and the attributes of a young lady passing out commodities at the VFW could hardly be construed as law enforcement communications.

We are certain the commissioners wouldn't want to run the risk of interfering with possible vital information between departments, especially when informed it is a violation of F.C.C. regulations. According to the F.C.C., the maximum fine for violations of this ruling is \$10,000.00.

We feel it would be advantageous for the court to look at alternative means of communications for the commissioners and their employees rather than run the risk of being fined by the F.C.C.

Dear Honorable Commissioners:

Realizing that resistance to change is characteristic of many law enforcement agencies based on the necessity of persuasive solicitation from municipal managers, there is demandly present a dire need for an improved radio communications system in Sabine County Sheriff's Department.


Reliability of communications is the lifeline between the patrol officer, the Sheriff's Department, and the community. All law enforcement personnel operating in Sabine County are continually cognizant of the requirements for transacting business in extended and isolated areas with the knowledge that assistance in case of emergency, or "Officer needs assistance", is not readily available. With the absence of immediate assistance coupled with congested and ineffective communications a precarious and stressful situation is composed further exposing the officer and county to a potential litigious situation. I am capable of citing, with reinforcement from all law enforcement personnel operating in Sabine County, that our present communications system is not reliable, clear, fast, and functional, and is not conducive to the enhancement of law enforcement motivation or citizenry confidence.

I am not a Doctor of Jurisprudence, and I do not offer legal advice, but I respectfully submit to the Honorable Commissioners Court that unless we structure our Communication System to reduce officers response time, add flexibility, and increase overall efficiency to ensure the safety of our law enforcement personnel and the citizenry we must be prepared to confront the civil

I am critical of the existing radio communications at the Sabine County Sheriff's Department for various reasons.

Every Law-Enforcement Agency in Sabine County are dependent upon this central terminal. Our lives as well as the lives of those we serve could be jeopardized without good communications.

There are times when the static is so severe I can hardly understand anything. There are times when I hear someone call my number only and I don't hear who is calling me. For instance, I should hear "Hemphill to 67" but all I hear is "67". I have no earthly idea who is calling me unless by some chance I recognize their voice. At other times I cannot understand any of their communications or perhaps only part of it. I get discouraged from checking out of car at locations because I figure the dispatcher doesn't hear me anyway because many times I never get a reply or if I do, I know they're saying something but I don't know what.

I feel the scrambler is also a vital necessity to Law Enforcement Communications for security reasons. There has been times I needed to tell an officer something very important but couldn't put it on the radio because of so many scanners.

I feel the radio at the Sheriff's Office is so obsolete and wore out that one day it will cost someone their life.

Dear Commissioners:

I am writing to you regarding the radio service of the Sabine County Sheriff's Department. I have found that the service is very inefficient. This inefficiency occurs at different times of the day and creates a dangerous situation.

For instance, my main shift is from 6 p.m. until 4 a.m., if I make a traffic stop it is very important to my safety to be able to give to the sheriff's office dispatcher the license plate number and the location where I stop the vehicle. If the radio service is inoperative at the time I start to get out, or the dispatcher is unable to hear or understand me due to inefficient radio contact, then I am the one in trouble. There is always a chance of a dangerous situation occurring during an arrest.

Due to the fact, that the 6 p.m. to 4 a.m. shift has only one patrolman out, the radio is this patrolman's only link to help for myself or any other person in an emergency situation, while on the side of the roadway.

I cannot stress enough the importance of a good-dependable radio system.

Late at night around Pineland and in the south of Sabine County, we pick up so much skip from Livingston and Jacksonville that we cannot talk to the Sherriff's Office. There has been several occassions that I could not hear other officers or the Sherriff's Office.


I feel we need to update our radio system for the officers' safety and the safety of the people we are trying to protect. We work short handed all the time. We have to help each other in all departments. If we cannot talk to each other, sooner or later an officer is going to get hurt or killed because he could not get help. We are always ten to twenty minutes from our nearest backup officer. If it takes another ten or twenty minutes to get someone on the radio because it is not working right then, we are in trouble.

If we could get the scrambled channel capability it would sure help keep the thieves from knowing where we are at all times. We cannot talk about drugs or anything on the radio because everyone has a scanner. The dopeheads and thieves know what we are doing at all times.

Anything that can be done sure would help. It is a bad feeling out on the streets knowing the radio is messing up and you might need help at any time. I don't know what it will take to fix the radio system but it is very poor now.


The Sabine County Sheriff's Department is in desperate need of new radio equipment. Since the Department is so small we are forced to ride alone over the county and precincts with just a radio as our partner.

To me, purchasing new radio equipment would be a very small price to pay for the safety of our officers. In the same sense it would be preventative against any possible lawsuits being brought against the county; in the event an officer is injured or a citizens injury could have been prevented or lessened with a properly functioning radio system. I have heard officers, at different times attempting to give their location on a traffic stop several times before the dispatcher could understand them due to faulty mikes and radios. An incident is going to happen when there just won't be time for the officer to make these repeated calls.

In comparison to other county equipment that has been purchased, a good, workable communications system is a small price to pay for the safety of our officers, and the citizens of Sabine County.

I am asking that you put this request at the very top of your list of priorities.

DEAR HONORABLE MEMBERS OF COMMISSIONERS COURT,

SABINE COUNTY IS NOT UNLIKE MANY OTHER EAST TEXAS COUNTIES IN THAT THE SHERIFFS OFFICE IS THE CENTER OF COMMUNICATION FOR ALL COUNTY, MUNICIPAL, AND STATE LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES. THE COUNTY CARRIES THE BURDEN AND LIABILITY FOR PROVIDING PRECISE AND EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION FOR THE SAFETY OF THE LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS WITHIN THE COUNTY, MANY OF WHICH ARE ONE MAN UNITS WITH LITTLE OR NO BACKUP. HOWEVER, LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONEL REPRESENT ONLY ONE ASPECT OF THE NEED FOR A COMPETENT AND RELIABLE COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM. THE LOCAL AMBULANCE AND WRECKER SERVICES ALONG WITH VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENTS DEPEND ON THE COUNTY COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM TO DISPATCH EMERGENCY CALLS. THESE AGENCIES ULTIMATELY SERVE AND ARE FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE CITIZENS OF SABINE COUNTY.

THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PRESENT SYSTEM EMPLOYED BY SABINE COUNTY IS DEMINISHED AS A RESULT OF THREE SERIOUS PROBLEMS;

- 1) THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY THERE ARE AREAS WHERE COMMUNICATIONS CANNOT BE RECIEVED SUCH AS INDIAN MOUNDS, BROOKLYN, AND FAIRMONT AREAS.
- 2) THE BLEEDING OVER OF AIR TRAFFIC THAT SHARES THE SABINE COUNTY FREQUENCY, .ie., LIVINGSTON AND JACKSONVILLE, WHICH CREATES CONFUSION AND INTERUPTS EMERGENCY TRANSMISSIONS IN THIS COUNTY.
- 3) EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE IS CERTAINLY A CONSIDERATION AS REPAIR WILL BECOME A CHALLENGE. PARTS FOR THE CURRENT SYSTEM AND ITS ANTIQUATED TECHNOLOGY WILL BE DIFFICULT TO PROCURE, POSSIBLY LEAVING THE COUNTY AND ITS CITIZENS WITHOUT COMMUNICATION FOR A LENGTHLY PERIOD.


WITH THE INCEPTION OF THE 911 EMERGENCY SERVICE THE COUNTY HAS TAKEN ON ADDED RESPONSIBILITY AND LIABILITY FOR DISPATCHING EMERGENCY CALLS. THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THIS PUBLIC SERVICE IS ONLY AS GOOD AS THE EQUIPMENT USED TO DISPATCH EMERGENCY CALLS.

Subject: New radio equipment for Sabine County S. O.

As a peace officer using the Sabine County radio frequency, I feel like new and updated radio equipment is a must for the county. The present system is weak and unreliable and places an officers' safety in jeopardy. A reliable system is needed to protect the lives of officers and citizens of Sabine County.

At the present time there are many areas of the County where an officer has no radio contact with the S. O. due to dead spots. I personally have found these dead spots in the southern portions of the County, particularly in the Fairmount area and on Toledo Bend Lake.

There have been many occasions when I could not contact the S. O. due to interference or dead spots. As a one man patrol unit, as are other officers in Sabine County, I depend on reliable radio communication for my personal safety and the safety of others. Interference from other agencies have made radio contact with the S. O. difficult or impossible. On several occasions I have had to phone the S. O. for information because of this interference. Using the phone is not always possible or practical. Should an occasion develop where lives are in danger, dependable radio contact is a must.

Concerning the scrambled channel capability, I feel it is necessary for efficient law enforcement. Due to the number of scanners in the county, everyone knows what each officer is doing, including a person committing

a crime. With scrambled channel capability, some of these violators could be apprehended that would not be possible otherwise.

Law Enforcement Officers of Sabine County have had and still do have problems with the Sabine County Sheriff's Department radio communications. I am one of three Texas State Game Wardens stationed in Sabine County who primarily work as a one man unit. I have only been stationed in Sabine county for about three years, however on several occasions I have been in very remote areas working alone and not have any communication with the Sheriff's Office. We, all officers in Sabine County primarily work alone and depend on the radio system that the county has available. The Sabine County Sheriff's Department radio system is the only frequency that all officers of Sabine County have in common to communicate with each other. Many times a situation that arises may first only require one officer's presence, however that need may change without warning and an officer may need backup or other emergency personnel without any delay to ensure the safety of everyone involved. I have on a few occasions, mostly at night made a stop and have a need to communicate with the Sheriff's Office and was unable to do so. Some times I was able to talk on a car to car frequency to another officer, and that officer relay messages back and forth between myself and the Sheriff's Office, however this has not always been the case. In situations when there is another officer close enough to relay messages, if time is a safety factor the officer is still handicapped. As many remote areas as there are in Sabine County a situation as just mentioned could be very hazardous. The radio communications in Sabine County are not primitive, however they are outdated. One officer's safety being jeopardized one time could justify the trouble, agrivation, and expense that an upgraded radio system could prevent.

Many times when an officer is looking for a particular person or vehicle there has to be some communication on the radio about that person or vehicle, and with the saturation of scanners in the area everyone including the person the officer is looking for knows. I realize that the public is curious as to what is happening out in the field, however that curriosity often prevents the officer from being able to apprehend the person he is after. A radio system with scrambling and descrambling capability would be one of the best moves for better Law Enforcemnet and criminal apprehension that could be made.

I know that the communications that we have here in Sabine County could be worse, or we could not have access to radio communications at all, however I also know that there is a lot of room for improvement. I would like to say that the Game Wardens of Sabine County do appreciate the use of the Sheriff's Department radio frequency as well as all the help and support of the Sabine County Sheriff's Department.


Our Radio Communications System is in need of being updated in Sabine County. The system is the only link between the Officer and his survival. At times there is no contact with Sabine County Sheriffs Department, especially from the South and West ends of the County. The system allows Polk County and Jacksonville Police Department to bleed over. We are unable to reach fellow Officers in the County for assistance at times. Sure, I have communication with Lufkin DPS and the surrounding Counties but assistance from them would be a long time coming. The system, (plainly speaking), is worn out and outdated.

With the inception of 911, it would be a necessity to have adequate and proper Communications to the Ambulance Companies, Fire Departments, and local, County, and State Law Enforcement personnel. Without radio communication there would be no need for 911.

A system with scramble capability is a very important tool to law enforcement. This allows Officers to carry out their duties without the general public or wanted Felons knowledge of the events taking place with the use of scanners growing.

Dear Judge Smith and County Commissioners:

I am writing to encourage you to appropriate funds necessary for the purchase of new radio equipment to be placed in the Sabine County Jail and used by the Sheriff's Department, the Police Departments of Hemphill and Pineland, the Department of Public Safety, the Parks and Wildlife Department, the County Constables and the numerous volunteer fire departments throughout the county.

The equipment now in place at the County Jail is antiquated and is subject to several "dead spots" in the county where no radio contact can be made. Since most of the time the patrol units of the law enforcement agencies are being operated alone, the only "partner" the officers have is at the other end of their radios. Unfortunately emergencies involving officers or citizens cannot be relied upon to occur only in areas of the county where radio contact is currently available or during times when the present system is operating properly. A tragedy that could have been avoided with reasonably operable radio equipment could easily present financial exposure as well as the attendant grief, in that the County would be liable for personal injuries or property damage that could be traced to faulty or inadequate communication capacity.

I am of course sensitive to the fact that you are constantly confronted with worthwhile ways to spend the County's money. It is my sincere belief that the appropriation necessary to obtain funds for the purchase of new radio equipment is deserving of a priority and can be successfully defended to your constituents.






