Tuesday, January 21, 1997, the Sabine County Commissioners' Court met in special session. The following members were present:

Judge Leath called the meeting to order and Commissioner Will Smith led the Court in prayer.

Agenda item #1-General Business

Commissioner Clark moved to approve as written the minutes for the following Court sessions: December 19, 1996 special,

December 23, 1996 regular, January 14, 1997 emergency. Commissioner Will Smith seconded. All voted for. Motion carried.

Agenda item #2-Auto Insurance

Judge Leath told the Court that the Sheriff's vehicles are not currently insured for auto physical damage and have not been for at least a year. The repairs for a couple of recent accidents have been paid for out of the budget. He ask Sheriff Tom Philips if he feels that the cars are valuable enough for this coverage.

Sheriff Philips presented an inventory of the vehicles to the Court. He stated that he does not know the trade-in value. See attached copies.

Judge Leath said that maybe the Court needed to evaluate it a little further and discuss it later under agenda item #12.

Agenda item #3-Deferred Compensation Plan

Judge Leath told the Court that there are two County employees that currently enrolled in this plan. He has read through the plan and all that they are doing is changing some language. Judge Leath stated that he did not find anything objectionable.

Judge Leath moved to adopt the amendments to the compensation plan. Commissioner Clark seconded. All voted for. Motion carried.

Agenda item #4-Hogan Corporation -- Bob Hogan

Judge Leath told the Court that Bob Hogan is not going to be present today. He said that in the past week or so, Mr. Hogan has been in contact with South Sabine Water Supply Corporation, Beechwood Water Supply Corporation, G-M Water Supply Corporation and Brookeland. What he has done is presented his proposals and requested their permission to apply for funding for varias programs. See attached copies of letters from South Sabine Water Supply Corporation, Beechwood Water Supply Corporation and G-M Water Supply Corporation. If these grant applications are approved, this will bring jobs to the County. The total cost is

estimated at thirty-six million dollars.

Commissioner Will Smith moved to approve the Resolution recommending the funding of the EDAP program in Sabine County. Commissioner Clark seconded. All voted for. Motion carried. See attached copy of resolution.

Agenda item #5-Jail Remodeling

Sheriff Tom Philips met with the Court requesting some remodeling he would like to have done to the jail. See attached copies.

Commissioner Lynn Smith moved to approve the following changes to the jail with the understanding to shop around for more cost estimates:

1-Remove the wall between the Deputy room and DPS and Game Warden room and make this into one large room.

2-Put an outside entry/exit door into the Deputy, DPS and Game Warden room for officers and sheriff's office personnel on the West side of jail. This door will be a keyless entry system and will be locked from the outside at all times.

3-Buzz door located in the hallway between the dispatch room and the holding room will have to have an electromagnetic lock with a key backup. A release button will be located in the dispatch room.

Commissioner Clark seconded. All voted for. Motion carried.

Commissioner Will Smith ask how much money is allocated in the anticipated note funds for renovations to the jail.

Judge Leath said that he will check on this and let him know at the next meeting.

Agenda item #12-Sheriff Tom Philips and Agenda item #14-Approve to Charge Fees to Run Criminal History (C.C.H.)

Sheriff Philips told the Court that storage fees in the past have eaten up the equity in seized vehicles and he would like for this not to happen in the future. He said that we have several at Ray's Body Shop right now. He would like for the Court to consider a holding facility for seized vehicles.

Also, he presented to the Court a code of ethics for the Sabine County Sheriff's department.

Next, Sheriff Philips requested that the Court approve for the Sheriff's department to be able to charge for running a criminal history and finger printing of individuals under the Brady Bill. Most department and other agencies charge for this service. The fee which is set by state statues is \$10.00 for criminal history and \$10.00 for finger printing. Individuals that are applying for a concealed weapon license are mainly the ones that will have a request for this service.

Commissioner Lynn Smith moved to approve for the Sheriff's department to charge these fees. Commissioner Doyle Dickerson seconded. All voted for. Motion carried.

Vol BB Po SG

Sheriff Philips gave the Court a list of civil process. He said that he doesn't know if fees were collected on these. In the future, they are going to a have a tracking system and will be able to tell the Attorneys the status of the civil process and a tracking system on the \$45.00 fee for service.

Next, he gave a vehicle inventory of the patrol cars, two employees that have maximum allowed overtime hours and a report of the dispatchers and jailers. He stated that there are 16 hours a week that cannot be covered without overtime for the dispatchers and jailers. He is proposing to the Court to authorize the Sheriff's department to employ four part time employees at a \$7.08 per hour rate of pay to cover the 16 hours and vacation time. This would be a possible savings of \$9,282.16 per year.

Commissioner Clark told Sheriff Philips that he understands that back in 1991, the Court approved giving the deputies a fairly good raise in lieu of overtime and this was agreeable with the deputies then. He stated that most of them does not work there anymore, but now overtime is eating us up. Also, the deputies are making more than some of the elected officials. The deputies' salary may have to be cut.

Sheriff Philips said that according to the Federal government, wage and hour commission, you cannot give up your rights like that. We want good competent people, not just someone off the street.

Judge Leath stated that somewhere along the way, the in lieu of got lost. He said that we also want good competent people for the elected offices, so what is the difference.

Sheriff Philips said that in his opinion, law enforcement is more important. Also, he is not going to be allowed to be the jail administrator so he is going to put Bruce White back into that position. He stated that there are a lot of headaches involved with this position and he would like to make Bruce a chief deputy.

Court recessed at 10:22 a.m.

Court reconvened at 10:40 a.m.

Back to agenda item #12-Sheriff Tom Philips

There was more discussion. No motions were made. See attached copies.

Agenda item #11-Tax Assessor Collector Bond

Commissioner Doyle Dickerson moved to approve the Tax Assessor Collector Bond. Commissioner Clark seconded. All voted for. Motion carried.

Agenda item #19-Approval of Funds for Conversion of Manual Bookkeeping onto Computer - Tax Office

The Court told Tammy to take this out of her present budget and no motions need to be made.

Agenda item #20-Executive Session (Personnel)

Court went into executive session at 10:50 a.m. Sheriff Philips was present.

Court reconvened into regular session at 11:35 a.m.

Agenda item #6-R&B Refund Request (Johnny Bendy)

Judge Leath moved to refund Johnny Bendy \$10.00 R&B fee. 'Commissioner Will Smith seconded. All voted for. Motion carried. See attached copy.

Agenda item #7-County Judge & Commissioners Conference No action is to be taken on this item.

Agenda item #8-County Judge & Commissioners Continuing Education Certificates





There are currently 8 permanent employees authorized as dispatchers / jailers at the Sabine County Sheriff's Department. These employees earn 9.65 per hour. With the current 8 authorized employees there are 16 hours a week that can not be covered without overtime.

Three employee's currently get 2 weeks vacation, the other five employees get 1 week vacation.

The 16 hours per week uncovered would result in 832 hours overtime pay in a one year period. Overtime pay rate for these employees is \$14.48 per hour which totals \$11,902.56.

11 weeks vacation totals 440 hours compensated at the overtime rate is a total of \$6,371.20.

\$11,902.56 \$ 6,371.20

Total \$18,273.76

There is a provision which allows part-time employees who work less than 40 hours per week to be compensated at the regular rate of pay, less benefits. For jailers and dispatchers the rate is currently \$7.08 per hour. If the above described hours were worked by part-time employees the cost to the county would be 1270 hours at 7.08 per hour, for a total of \$8,991.60.

I propose to the commissioners court to authorize the Sheriff's Office to employe 4 part-time employees as dispatchers/jailer. By using effective scheduling the resulting savings not counting possible sick leave or comp days would be on the hours listed above.

Code of Ethics of The Office of the Sheriff

s a constitutionally elected Sheriff, I recognize and accept that I am given a special trust and confidence by the citizens and employees whom I have been elected to serve, represent and manage. This trust and confidence is my bond to ensure that I shall behave and act according to the highest personal and professional standards. In furtherance of this pledge, I will abide by the following Code of Ethics.

I SHALL ENSURE that I and my employees, in the performance of our duties, will enforce and administer the law according to the standards of the U.S. Constitution, State of Texas Constitution and applicable statutes so that equal protection of the law is guaranteed to everyone. To that end I shall not permit personal opinions, party affiliations, or consideration of the status of others to alter or lessen this standard of treatment of others.

I SHALL ESTABLISH, PROMULGATE AND ENFORCE a set of standards of behavior of my employees which will govern the overall management and operation of the law enforcement functions, court related activities, and corrections operations of my Office.

I SHALL NOT TOLERATE NOR CONDONE brutal or inhumane treatment of others by my employees nor shall I permit or condone inhumane or brutal treatment of inmates in my care and custody.

I STRICTLY ADHERE to standards of fairness and integrity in the conduct of campaigns for election and I shall conform to all applicable statutory standards of election financing and reporting so that the Office of the Sheriff is not harmed by the actions of myself or others.

I SHALL ROUTINELY CONDUCT or have conducted an internal and external audit of the public funds entrusted to my care and publish this information so that citizens can be informed about my stewardship of these funds.

I SHALL FOLLOW the accepted principles of efficient and effective administration and management as the principle criteria for my judgements and decisions in the allocation of resources and services in law enforcement, court related and corrections functions of my Office.

I SHALL HIRE AND PROMOTE only those employees or others who are the very best candidates for a position according to accepted standards of objectivity and merit. I shall not permit other factors to influence hiring or promotion practices.

I SHALL ENSURE that all employees are granted and receive relevant training supervision in the performance of their duties so that competent and excellent service is provided by the Office of the Sheriff.

I SHALL ENSURE that during my tenure as Sheriff, I shall not use the Office of Sheriff for private gain.

I ACCEPT AND WILL ADHERE TO THIS CODE OF ETHICS. In so doing, I also accept responsibility for encouraging others in my profession to abide by this Code.

BASIC POLICE JUVENILE OFFICER May 5-9 • San Marcos • \$225

The needs of law enforcement officers recently assigned to juvenile units or assigned to investigate juveniles are addressed in this basic school. Topics include the history of the juvenile justice system, selected cases affecting the system, substance abuse, suicide, juvenile sex offenders, youth gang identification, investigation of missing children, and school search and seizure. An in-depth coverage of law enforcement responsibility pursuant to Texas Family Code, Titles II and III, and a practical application of working with other criminal justice professionals are provided.

BASIC SRO / ISD POLICE

June 9 - 13 • Austin. • \$225

The multipurpose curriculum offers topics of interest to officers whose responsibilities involve law enforcement education, intervention, or prevention. This basic course is designed for officers employed by or assigned to a school district. Specific training components include the Texas Juvenile Justice Code, Texas Education Code, search and seizure on school property, adapting to the school environment, and interview and interrogation techniques. Specific needs and duties which normally differentiate the concepts, priorities, and perspectives of the school resource officer from the school district police officer will also be addressed.

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) brings together law enforcement, planning, zoning, code enforcement, construction permits, other municipal departments, as well as concerned citizens to create an environment that reduces crime and increases the chances for safer communities. Participants are involved in group discussions which focus on the respective roles of individual municipal agencies. Trainees make two field trips during this 24-hour course.

INTERVIEW / INTERROGATION TECHNIQUES

February 24-25 • Galveston • \$90 April 7-8 • Longview • \$90

This course is designed to provide interviewers with various methods to detect deception, observation of physical signs, analysis of written statements, and interrogation techniques based on the personality of the interviewer and/or the crime being investigated.

EXECUTIVE / FAMILY PROTECTION

May 19-21 • Corpus Christi • \$120

Participants receive step-by-step instructions in developing individual or family protection plans through the completion and use of personal information packets. Areas of instruction include profiling a potential target; preventive measures and tactics potential targets should exercise; strategies in response to kidnap or extortion situations; notification plan for family and other law enforcement agencies, and the selection of a family crisis coordinator and a crisis management team.

DOMESTIC TERRORISM

✓ May 21-23 • Corpus Christi • \$120

This course is designed to assist law enforcement agencies in recognizing, responding to, and reducing the threat of terrorism. The course focuses specifically on terrorists and terrorist organizations operating within the United States. Special emphasis given to groups of the far right, including the Christian identity movement, neo-Nazis, and militia movement. Groups and individuals are discussed, as well as their tactics, operational methodology, and areas of operation. Topics include weapons and explosive techniques employed by terrorists; issues in nuclear, biological, and chemical terrorism; counter-terrorist options; issues of authority; federal assistance; state and federal law sed to arrest terrorists, and other available response options.

MORE TRAINING

BASIC CRIME STOPPERS

January 22 -24 • Odessa • \$65

The material presented in this course is designed to provide a basic understanding and working knowledge of all phases of the Crime Stoppers program and is recommended for all new program coordinators, board members, media representatives, and investigators. Planning, developing, and operating a program are discussed along with working informants and documenting information. Publicity and fund-raising programs, Campus Crime Stoppers programs, legal issues and liabilities are also presented.

20-Hr JUVENILE LAW

February 11-13 • Corpus Christi • \$175

This program is designed to meet the needs of peace officers and juvenile probation officers. The course emphasizes a practical understanding of Titles II and III of the Texas Family Code. Case decisions, federal guidelines, and liability issues affecting the juvenile justice system are presented as well as selected areas of the Texas Education Code and search and seizure in schools.

INTRODUCTION TO CRIME PREVENTION

February 17-21 • Arlington • \$160 April 28 - May 2 • Corpus Christi • \$160

This course, worth two TCLEOSE points, is recommended for patrol, investigative, and supervisory personnel interested in an overview of crime prevention. The program provides fundamental concepts and techniques of security as they relate to prevention. Students are provided with the basic skills necessary to remove obvious crime risks. Trainees are also taught to conduct residential inspections in compliance with the Texas Insurance Code. Successful course completion fulfills TCLEOSE training requirement for crime prevention inspector and homeowners insurance inspector.

COMMUNITY POLICING ISSUES

March 25-26 • Garland • \$95

This course presents the philosophies and concepts of community policing. Topics include community assessment techniques and crime analysis for tactical and operational applications. Problem-oriented policing programs and comprehensive community programming are discussed. Other topics include the pyramid approach to resources which enhance the program; volunteer networking programs, and other programs to expand community policing.
