2024 Sabine County Landowner Improvement In-Depth Summary

RELEVANCE

Agriculture is one of the main sources of income for Sabine County with gross sales over 17.7 million dollars annually according to the 2017 Census of Agriculture. Livestock and forage production account for more than 17.2 million dollars of that total. According to the census report each producer supplements their income on the average with almost \$8,000 annually.

Livestock production, weed control, improved pastures, and hay production are an important part of the agricultural makeup of Sabine County. The ever-changing dynamics of livestock and forage production present difficult decisions for producers. Changes in the marketplace, weather, and input costs all affect the bottom line of our beef and forage producers.

- 38,304 Acres in agriculture production
- \$88,575 Market value of products sold per farm

Sabine County has also been home to an increasing number of new landowners. Providing additional programming for new landowners over wildlife, soil health, and pond maintenance can help maintain land health and potential profits. Improvement programs teach landowners how to enhance the productivity of their land, whether through improved agricultural techniques, reforestation, or better grazing practices. Or, through better timber, wildlife, and fish habitat management. This can increase the land's economic value and yield, benefiting the owner financially while promoting sustainable use.

RESPONSE

The Sabine County Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee provided leadership in planning, implementation, and evaluation of all livestock, natural resource, and new landowner programs. Livestock and forage producers, as well as general landowners, increased their knowledge and adoption of practices through educational workshops, clinics, and news articles in the areas of livestock, forage, and land/resource management. 2023 Agriculture and Natural Resource Youth Development In-Depth Summary

RELEVANCE

The need for agriculture education is ever growing. Increased knowledge of agriculture and nutrition allows youth to make informed personal choices about diet and health. Informed citizens will be able to participate in establishing the policies that will support a competitive agricultural industry in this country and abroad. The goal for agriculture literacy is for youth to understand how food, fiber and renewable resource products are produced, value the essential role of agriculture in maintaining a strong economy, appreciate the role agriculture plays in providing safe, abundant and affordable products, and acknowledge and consider career opportunities in the agriculture, food, fiber and renewable resource industries.

Sabine county has a population of 10, 039 spanning over 577 square miles. In 2021 (most recent data) 17.6% of the population is under the age of 18 thus providing a large youth audience in which to educate and address these issues concerning agriculture literacy.

RESPONSE







- I attended the SCEDAC meeting on August 27 in Hemphill. I wrote letters of support on behalf of SCEDAC for the City of Hemphill's quest to be named the Bass Fishing Capital of Texas and for the Good Jobs Challenge Grant Application for the Stephen F. Austin State University (SFASU), Center for Applied Research and Rural Innovation (CARRI) to the Economic Development Administration (EDA).
- We have applied for three (3) more paddling trails through the Texas Parks & Wildlife. These will be located on Toledo Bend at the Mid-Lake Campground, Sandals & Spurs Lakefront Resort, and Lost Frontier R.V. Park & Marina. We hosted a site visit with John Botros, Texas Parks & Wildlife on August 27 and toured all 3 routes by boat. We are now working with Mr. Botros to gather all of the information for the paddling trail website as well as the information for the 3 kiosks that will be placed at the launch sites. Should complete the paddling trails by the end of 2024. We already have the sign frames on hand for the information kiosk. We have also replaced the kiosk sign for Patroon Bay which was lost during the tornado that came through Holly Park.
- The tourism website has been reconstructed to make it more mobile phone and user friendly. Pennie Ferguson has made numerous updates that need to be made. Pennie now has access to the website to make corrections and additions in a timelier manner and has done a great job in updating the information. Please visit the website at https://visitsabinecounty.com/.
- Since we have updated the hotel feasibility study with Source Strategies, we have been sending the updated information to previous contacts that were made earlier for potential hotel developers to let them know about the new development at Sabinetown Park. We will be following up with a meeting with a hotel that expressed interest. I also presented the study to 2 other hotel possibilities this past month.
- We have also been submitting similar information to restaurants to try and be better prepared when Sabinetown Park opens. Two restaurants have been contacted this past month to get them interested in looking at Sabine County.
- We have renewed our contract with Go-Texas Travel Sites, an online tourism marketing firm that markets Sabine County. We have received 762 requests thus far in 2024. We received 1,870 requests for information in 2023. Since inception in December 2019, we have received 6,914 requests for information. All inquiries receive an email promoting Sabine County along with a link to our website and the Sabine County Magazine. We maintain a complete database for future marketing.
- We submitted an RFI to the Governor's Office of Economic Development on November 1, 2023, for Project Cabana 3. This is a project that is looking to build a complex of hydroponic greenhouses for growing vegetables large grocery chains and prefers to locate in rural areas. They will be developing 12 greenhouses in several states and should begin looking at Texas sites in 2025. The consultant is impressed with our site and its capabilities. We follow-up regularly with the consultant to assure him of Sabine County's interest in this project..
- We are working with the Texas Forest Country Partnership in exploring the possibility of a Foreign Trade Zone (FTZ) for the rural counties of the TFCP. Sabine County has agreed to participate in the feasibility study to determine if this is a viable project for the area.
