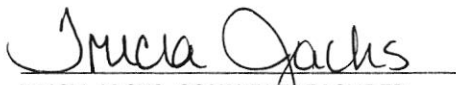


TREASURER'S CERTIFICATE

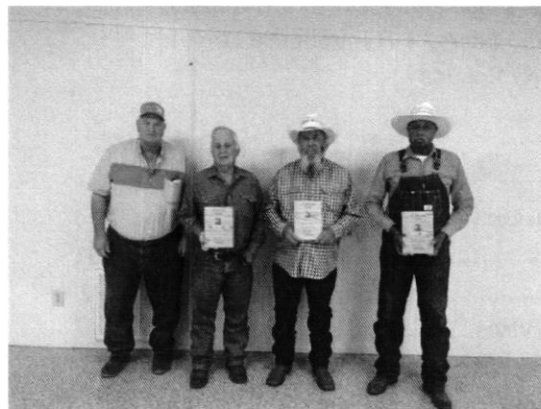

In-Depth Program Planning

Sabine County Agriculture and Natural Resources Program

- Landowner Improvement Programs
- Target audience of Sabine County landowners to include approximately 100 family-owned farms.
- Work with Sabine County Ag Committee (comprised of 6 members) to provide leadership to agriculture programs. Utilize members in various programs such as registration, marketing, and resources.

Sabine County Agriculture and Natural Resources

Professionalism

Ag/NR Agent communicates efficiently with other agents, specialists, volunteers, and other county employees/officials. Agent follows instructions and complies with policies and procedures of Sabine County and Extension, takes initiative, is actively involved in the community in effort to build support and relationships and represents Extension positively in all aspects.

RELEVANCE

The need for agriculture education is ever growing. Increased knowledge of agriculture and nutrition allows youth to make informed personal choices about diet and health. Informed citizens will be able to participate in establishing the policies that will support a competitive agricultural industry in this country and abroad. The goal for agriculture literacy is for youth to understand how food, fiber and renewable resource products are produced, value the essential role of agriculture in maintaining a strong economy, appreciate the role agriculture plays in providing safe, abundant and affordable products, and acknowledge and consider career opportunities in the agriculture, food, fiber and renewable resource industries.

Sabine county has a population of 10, 039 spanning over 577 square miles. In 2021 (most recent data) 17.6% of the population is under the age of 18 thus providing a large youth audience in which to educate and address these issues concerning agriculture literacy.

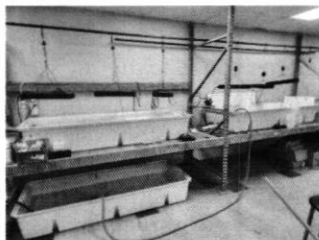
- 119 of 123 (96.75%) participants learned four varieties of cattle produced in Sabine County
- Of the 123 participants 112 (91.06%) said they learned the effects of poison ivy.
- 110 of 123 (89.43%) Participants increased their knowledge of basic horse anatomy.

Sabine County Rabbit Showmanship Clinic -

- 19 of the 20 participants (95%) stated they learned new skills in showing their rabbit properly, answering judge's questions, and terminology involved in showing rabbits.

RESULTS CONT'D.

East Texas Show Star Series- 160 of 201 (79.6%) participants at the East Texas Show Star Series responded:

- 152 of 201 (95%) indicated that they learned new skills to help show their animal better.
- 152 of 160 (95%) indicated that learned new skills in feeding, show prep, health, and daily management.
- 143 of 201 (89.4%) indicated that they are more confident in their ability in the show ring.

SUMMARY

Sabine County Junior Livestock Show had a total of 25 pens of rabbits, 18 pens of broilers and 31 swine, 15 goats and lambs, 4 steers and 3 heifer projects entered. All three school districts within Sabine County were present at the 4th Grade Agriculture Field Day. Sabine County Extension 4-H office met the goal of providing supplemental agriculture educational experiences to youth in Sabine County.

EVALUATION STRATEGY

Programs were evaluated with retrospective post surveys to determine if participants gained knowledge.

FUTURE PROGRAMMING

The programming efforts in this area will be intensified and expanded as resources become available and needs are more fully identified. Efforts are underway to re-evaluate ongoing educational programs to ensure improved quality to county clientele. At present, plans for 2026 include natural resource project workshops, shooting sports project area expansion, and improving multi-county programs.

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RELEVANCE

Agriculture is one of the main sources of income for Sabine County with gross sales over 17.7 million dollars annually according to the 2017 Census of Agriculture. Livestock and forage production account for more than 17.2 million dollars of that total. According to the census report each producer supplements their income on the average with almost \$8,000 annually.

Livestock production, weed control, improved pastures, and hay production are an important part of the agricultural makeup of Sabine County. The ever-changing dynamics of livestock and forage production present difficult decisions for producers. Changes in the marketplace, weather, and input costs all affect the bottom line of our beef and forage producers.

- 200 Farms with 100 being family owned
- 38,304 Acres in agriculture production
- \$88,575 Market value of products sold per farm

Sabine County has also been home to an increasing number of new landowners. Providing additional programming for new landowners over wildlife, soil health, and pond maintenance can help maintain land health and potential profits. Improvement programs teach landowners how to enhance the productivity of their land, whether through improved agricultural techniques, reforestation, or better grazing practices. Or, through better timber, wildlife, and fish habitat management. This can increase the land's economic value and yield, benefiting the owner financially while promoting sustainable use.

RESPONSE

The Sabine County Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee provided leadership in planning, implementation, and evaluation of all livestock, natural resource, and new landowner programs. This committee met five times during the 2023-2024 program year. Livestock and forage producers, as well as general landowners, increased their knowledge and adoption of practices through educational workshops, clinics, and news articles in the areas of livestock, forage, and land/resource management. The Leadership Advisory Board met four times during the programmatic year to discuss extension programs and their results. These programs were targeted to agriculture producers and other landowners that attend educational programs and events in which they wanted to sponsor. These programs/events included:

- **Sabine County Reporter Ag Agent Articles-** (1,200 subscribers) frequent articles pertaining to seasonal issues the county may be facing whether insect, disease, or growing conditions.
- **Master Gardener Garden Gazette** - (200 recipients) monthly garden newsletter to address timely horticulture topics, garden tasks, and upcoming extension programs.
- **Master Gardener Intern Class** - (August 14 - Nov 11, 5 Interns) Instructed 16 educational classes over basic horticultural concepts to total 50 educational classroom hours.
- **Sabine and San Augustine Hay Show and Forage Seminar-** (September 5, 25 attendees) - agent collected 52 hay samples on-site from 17 producers for analysis by Texas A&M Soil and Forages Lab and provided interpretation. Hay results were analyzed, and program discussed forage improvement strategies.
- **East Texas Wildlife Expo** - (October 6th, 43 participants) an annual multi-district program held in Jasper County marketed to Sabine and 9 other counties clientele to cover topical wildlife and natural resource management subjects to include a classroom and field portion.
- **Fall Garden Seminar** - (September 21, 23 attendees) Sabine Master Gardeners hosted fall gardening event to include topics like vegetable season extension, soil health, and native plantings.
- **Nacogdoches Ag Expo-** (November 3, 139 participants) an annual program held in Nacogdoches serving 3 counties providing 5 TDA CEU opportunities to producers.
- **Forest Pest Seminar** - (January 31, 101 attendees) - an annual program hosted in Angelina County by 8 counties in late winter, geared towards professionals and landowners interested in forestry and natural resource topics.

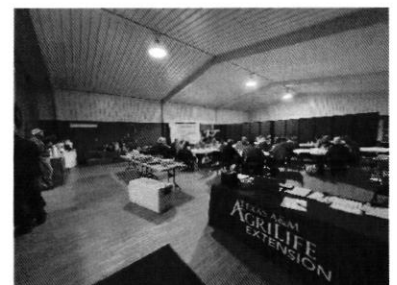

RESULTS

Ag Expo- 139 of 139 (100%) participants at the Nacogdoches Ag Expo responded:

Intention to Adopt: (Excludes Not Applicable or Already Adopted)

- (98.5%) indicated an increase in understanding of their knowledge about how to control weeds on their land.
- (98.5%) indicated an increase in understanding of their knowledge about how to maintain their pesticide license.
- (96.8%) indicated an increase in knowledge level about herbicide products.

Economic Impact:

- Per Head Basis- 111 producers indicated a mean economic benefit of **\$4,339.13** per producer = **\$481,643.43**
- Total Anticipated Economic Impact per (1) acre - **\$9.85**

Sabine and San Augustine Hay Show and Forage Seminar -20 of 25 (80%) participants at the Pineywoods Cow Congress responded:

Intention to Adopt: (Excludes Not Applicable or Already Adopted)

- 13 of 25 (72.2%) participants gained a better knowledge of the benefits of weed/brush control.
- 13 of 25 (72.2%) participants understood the importance of plant identification.
- 4 of 12 (57.1%) indicated intentions to adopt the recommended practices/technology to control weeds.

Forest Pest Seminar – 78 of 101 (77.2%) participants at the Forest Pest Seminar responded:

Intention to Adopt: (Excludes Not Applicable or Already Adopted)

- 40 of 44 (90.9%) reported that they will pay closer attention to pesticide labels including rates and application timing.
- 68 of 78 (90.6%) reported an increase in knowledge about the benefits and limitations of using UAS to assist competition control after the program.
- 27 of 45 (60%) reported that they plan to incorporate climate smart forestry strategies on acres that they own/manage.

SUMMARY

The total economic impact from the Ag Expo program was \$455,289.14. This averaged to approximately \$2,572.25 per participant regarding general and improved forage quality economic benefit.

EVALUATION STRATEGY

Programs were evaluated with retrospective post surveys to determine if participants gained knowledge, adopted practices, and measure anticipated economic benefit.

FUTURE PROGRAMMING

The programming efforts in this area will be intensified and expanded as resources become available and needs are more fully identified. Efforts are underway to re-evaluate ongoing educational programs to ensure improved quality to county clientele. At present, plans for 2026 include horticulture and wildlife programs, and continued forage development and weed control strategies.

Sabine County Economic Development Progress Report
July, August, September 2025

- We have completed submitting all the information for three (3) more paddling trails through the Texas Parks & Wildlife. These will be located on Toledo Bend at Mid Lake, Palo Gauchó Bayou, Lost Frontier, and Six Mile North Public Boat Launch. The official launch for these 4 trails was held on Thursday, August 28 at the Lost Frontier boat launch. Representatives from Texas Parks and Wildlife and Coastal Fisheries were present for the event as were approximately 25 local residents. The website for the paddling trails has been completed and is now online. A press release announcing the trails was sent to statewide media. The maps in the kiosks have all been installed at the launch site of the trails. The addition of these 4 trails gives us a total of 5 paddling trails on Toledo Bend. All 5 trails were certified in time for use by the Bassmaster Kayak Series national bass tournament which was held on Toledo Bend Reservoir in Sabine County on September 27 & 28, 2025. This is the first time that a Bassmaster Kayak Series has come to Toledo Bend. Approximately 140 fishermen participated in the tournament. Initial feedback from the event was very positive and we are hopeful that they will consider coming back to Toledo Bend in 2027 when Sabinetown Park is completed.
- We were contacted by Texas Department of Agriculture about the possibility of an additional \$250,000 to be added to our \$1 million grant for the amphitheater at Sabinetown Park. We met all requirements for the additional grant, and on September 29, the Sabine County Commissioner's Court awarded the amphitheater contract. Sabine River Authority is also adding funding for some additional amenities since the additional \$250,000 was granted. Clearing of the land for the amphitheater is underway.
- Since we have updated the hotel feasibility study with Source Strategies, we have been sending the updated information to previous contacts that were made earlier for potential hotel developers to let them know about the new development at Sabinetown Park. We are expecting a site visit from several hotel developers in October. We continue to send information to other hotel possibilities.
- We have also been submitting similar information to restaurants to try and be better prepared when Sabinetown Park opens. Three restaurants have been contacted to get them interested in looking at Sabine County. We have been in regular contact with the owner of the Dairy Queen building that lives in California. She has hired a contractor to do some much-needed maintenance work as well as getting the facility cleaned. We will continue to pursue this opportunity as well as looking for other opportunities.
- Since we no longer have someone updating the website, we are looking at various options to go forward. I have met with several website companies, and we are still in the process of evaluating our options. I have been working with Matt King to take out all the outdated information and updating basic information on the site. This has been completed.
